COUNCIL MEETING METIN

A meeting of the ISCA Council was held in Chappaign on November 5, 1977. All Council members were present and also in attendance were the Chairmen of the Ethica, Registration, and Membership Counittee; the Education and Fublic Relations (Counittee; and the Program Counittee.

Among items discussed included the rewording suggested for the Registration Bill (see August Neveletter), the possible requirement of registration of practicing soil classifiers in Illinois (including all government employees) if a Registration Bill is passed, and the possible need for some clarification for requirements of the "grandfather" clause

as presently written in the Bill. Also discussed were the possibilitles of joining with the geologists in a joint registration bill, the Certification program of professionals of the American Society of Agronomy, the progress on the educational slide set for the ISCA, and the program plans for the Annual Meeting.

The Council approved the application of one member at the Associate level. The Treasurer's report indicated a balance of §263.53.

NEWS OF THE WEMBERSHIP

As each year passes by, usually some of the Associate members become qualified for Full Membership as field experience time acquee. We congratulate Jerry Alexander (now in South Dakota), Gerry Berning, and Ken Gotsch on being promoted to Full Membership in ISCA.

Irene Watterson, Madison County, recently applied for Associate Membership and has been approved by the Council. Mark Bramstedt, Knox County; Bill Kreznor, Iroquois County; Dave Rahe, Madison County; and Randy Staley employed by Amax Goal Company of Indianapolis, Indiana have applied for Associate Membership and will be approved by the Council at their next meeting. We welcome these new members into the ISCA family

Chris Cochran has been on a special mapping assignment since early December in New Mexico. He is working on the Froject Soil Survey of Grant County and is located at Silver City. Chris learned the first day in the field that he couldn't work without a hat, which he customarily did in Champaign County. His assignment ends the latter part of this month, but he won't be back on the job in Champaign County until March. He is stopping in Lincoln, Nebraska enroute for a training session. We wonder if Chris will be ready to trade the spade for a soil probe again and if he will continue to map one or two thousand acres a day?

Lon Young, former ISCA member, dropped into Champaign a few months ago to check up on the Champaign County Soil Survey and activaties at the State S.C.S. Office. Wyoming seems to suit him well and he was full of tell stories about antelops hunting.

Five of our members recently completed a course at the Technical Center in Lincoln, Nebraska on "Soil Lab Data and Their Use." In attendance were Larry Acker, Ken Gotach, Henry Mount, Roser Windhorm, and Steve Zwicker. Henry and Steve were able to make good use of recently acquired data from the University of Illinois Pedology Lab. Roser is now prepared to instruct all those interested on how to crush coft shale samples for determination of coarse fragments.

The 1978 North Central Regional Soil Survey Workshop was held in Madison, Wisconsin January 30 through February 4. Those attending from the S.C.S. State Office were Wells Andrews. J. Wiley Soctt, and Earl Yoss. Attending from the Agronomy Department, University of Tilinois, were John Alexander. Ivan Jansen. Bob Fope, and Burt Ray. Most of the Workshop activity evolved around the functioning of several committees, both prior to and during the Workshop.

SOME CURRENT USES OF SOIL SURVEY INFORMATION

Steve Zwicker has provided us with the following items. Recently

In Lee County a housing developer was building on portions of the Rock River floodplain west of the town of Dixon. An alert and informed local County Planning Committee questioned the advisability of this practice and confronted the developer. An S.C.S. hydrologist and a hydrologist from a private consulting firm, at the request of the developer, investigated the area. In summary, all agreed that the soil map could be used to accurately delineate the floodplain area. The building program was halted and many potential homeowners were spared the high cost of mandatory flood insurance and probably many other disappointments.

Some opecial plans are being made locally for use of the recent ly finished Ogle County Soil Survey. Much direction for the program comes from D.C. John Conroy. It as copies of the soil map are being colored to indicate two grades of prime farmland. Floodplains and flood prone areas are indicated by using a combination of the soil map and topographic maps. Present plans are to photograph the maps so that an enlarged image of a section or two can be projected on a screen and studied by interested groups. These maps will be used extensively by the Zoning Commission and County Plat and Zoning Committee in making recommendations and decisions on use of areas in Ogle County.

FOR ANNUAL MEETING DISCUSSION

The Committee on Ethics, Registration, and Membership, J. B. Febrenbacher, Chairman, plans to bring up several Items at the Annual Meeting to which the membership might want to give some thought prior to the meeting. Some of this information was contained in reports in past Newsletters. Some important Items for discussion are:

 If and when a Registration Bill is passed in Illinois, should any practicing soil classifiers be exempted or should registration be required?

2. Do we want to retain our present name of Illinois Soil Classifiers Association or should we change it to Illinois Pedologists Association?

3. Should we continue to press for registration and do you feel registration would be worthwhile for the majority of our membership?

Discussion about ARCPACS (American Registry of Certified Professionals in Agronomy, Grops, and Solls), a non-profit corporation operated in cooperation with ASA, USSA, and SSBA is also scheduled. Present specialties, among others, include Soil Scientist and Soil Specialist. Other soil specialties might be added in the future. This is a certification program on a national level that is a voluntary procedure administered by a profession. Some individuals feel that being certified by a national organization may be helpful in registration attempts at the state level. If you desire information prior to the meeting, contact your colleagues who are members of ASA or SSBA, as they should have a pamphlet explaining the program.

WAKE YOUR INTERESTS KNOWN AND VOLUNTEER

PROS AND CONS OF REGISTRATION

Some "pros" and "cons" to registration are listed below. The list is not all-inclusive, but hopefully includes the major points and will be of some assistance in helping you consider the registration question.

Pros:

- Protects the public- Registration will help assure the caliber and competence of the individual involved in soil classification activities.
- Promotes high standards- A certain level of knowledge and experience will be required to become and to remain registered.
- Help expand job opportunities- Soil surveys are being used in more and more ways. Positions with other agencies and in the private sector will be more readily obtained.
- Identifies those that are qualified- Professional registration is recognized by others as an achievement not easily obtained.
- Recognition of the field- To become registered we will need to inform and educate lots of other professional people about who we are, what we do, and how we can protect the public welfare and promote wise land use.

Cons:

- Vill cost comething. There will be an annual registration fee. Also, there will be lots of effort to promote registration.
- Will establish rigid standards- Not all will qualify. You may be required to have your work approved by someone who is registered.
- May make you liable- The opportunity for law suits may be greater.
- State registration agency imposed duties— You may need to annually give an accounting of your activities as they relate to the profession.

 Certain forms may be required.
- Provide no economic gains- Most registered persons will not profit from becoming registered.

Pro arguments for changing the name from Illinois Soil Classifiers Association to Illinois Pedologists Association.

The present name is not descriptive of our total range of expertise. Pedology is an unfamiliar term to many because it has not been widely used. It is easier, however, to educate people concerning an unfamiliar term than it is to use a familiar term with a more narrow meaning and get people to notice and remember that we have assigned a new meaning to it. When the term Pedologist is used, those who are not familiar with the term usually ask for a definition, or read on to determine what it means. When the term Soil Classifier is used, people know what a classifier does and assume that we are using the term as it is defined in the dictionary. Even if we make a point of defining it for them, they are inclined not to pay much attention because they think that they already know what it means. Some of the objections to our bill raised by engineers seem to arise because they failed to comprehend what we really mean by soil classifying. The engineers were concerned that the term was too comprehensive, but in other ways the term is too narrow. I fear that most of the public will visualize a soil classifier as one who classifies soils and will tend to look elsewhere when they need help with interpretations, or even mapping of soils.

We had to introduce the term Pedology into our registration bill in order to satisfy engineers and geologists. Changing the name of our association would be consistent with that change in the registration bill. More widespread use of the term pedologist on business cards, signs, and in newspapers would soon make it a more familiar term. I believe the term pedologist will carry more prestige than the term soil classifiers ever will.

The idea of a deadline for the various issues of the Newsletter was discussed. Four Newsletters per year seemed an appropriate number.

Wells Andrews, Chairman of the Program Committee, Suggested that the membership should help in deciding what kind of a summer meeting to have. J. D. Alexander made the suggestion that we have a summer meeting similar to the last two we have had (one day, family picnic, short summer meeting). An educational summer meeting on strip mine reclamation might be a possibility. (Please note questionnaire on last page).

The results of an every member canvas conducted by Joe B. Fehrenbacher on the following three questions were conveyed to this meeting by John D. Alexander.

- Question 1: Should the Federal, State and other government unit employees practicing soil classifying work in Illinois be required in ISCA's proposed registration bill to be registered?
- Question 2: Should the name of the Illinois Soil Classifiers Association be changed to Illinois Pedologists Association?
- Cuestion #: Should the Illinois Soil Classifiers Association continue to push for passage of a Soil Classifiers registration bill in the Illinois Legislature?

The responses from the membership ere counted and summarized by Joe B. Fehrenbacher, Burton W. Ray and John D. Alexander. The summary of the responses to the questions were as follows:

Question 1: 36 yes votes; 3 no votes

Question 2: 33 yes votes; 12 no votes

Question 3: 36 yes votes; 9 no votes

Forty five of our (1 members responded to the above questions.

After a short discussion of the results of this membership vote, John D. Alexander moved that the results of this vote be implemented by the Illinois Classifiers Association. Wells Andrews 2nd the motion. The motion was passed unanimously by the Council.

In effect this means that:

- 1. As an association of professionals, we are in favor of all people practicing Pedology in Illinois be required to register under the proposed registration bill. The proposed bill will be changed to express this.
- 2. The name of the current Illinois Soil Classifiers Association will be changed to Illinois Pedologists Association. In order to accomplish this, changes will need to be made in our Constitution and By-Laws, Nembership Certification, Federal and State tax and incorporation status, logo, stationery, and other items of identification for our association.
- 3. We will continue to work for passage of a re istration bill for Pedologists.

PRESIDENT'S NOTE

With about 74% of the membership voting, It seems clear what our membership desires concerning name chan e and registration. The Council has, therefore, voted to implement the results of the poll, as indicated by the majority of the membership and has initiated the following actions:

1. The Ethics, Registration and Membership Committee will prepare a statement, to be circulated to the membership, explaining the implications of the proposed registration bill.

- 2. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee will submit revised sections of the constitution and by-laws.
- 3. The Public Relations and Education Committee will proceed with chan es in membership cards, logo, letterhead and envelopes.

The Illinois Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts will be meeting for their legislative meeting in June. This will provide us with an opportunity to enlist their support for our re-istration activities.

Mike Kiefer is looking for ideas on how our association might participate at the upcoming American Society of Agronomy Annual Meeting to be held in Chicago on December 3-0, 1973. One suggestion might be to have a booth where we could explain our association and its activities to date.

I want to encourage each member to maintain an active part in the association and to continue to share your ideas. Your participation will keep us moving along toward our goals.

SOIL SCIENTISTS FIELD WORKSHOP

The 1978 SCS Illinois Soil Scientists Workshop was held in Champaign County April 24-27. It consisted of both indoor and field exercises.

The indoor sessions were held at the Redwood Inn, Rantoul. Included were discussions of soil classification and mapping and uses of soil survey information.

An area northeast of Rantoul served as the location for field sessions. Workshop participants presented profiles of unique or "problem" soils brought from home and viewd some from other counties. After describing and classifying some of the local soils, the participants formed teams and mapped a 160 acre tract.

Activities at the Redwood Inn included a banquet on Monday evening. The featured speaker was Harold Poeschl, SCS State Resource Conservationist, who gave a program on the progress toward further implementation of water quality legislation in Illinois.


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

They are being sent to you in advance of our Annual Meeting (Saturday, Feb. 24th) as required by the Constitution under Article XII, Sec. 1. These ammendments require your careful thought and consideration.

Ammendment #1-- "The name of this Association shall be the Illinois Pedologists Association". (This name has been approved by a vote of the membership but the following changes in the Constitution must be adopted at the Annual Meeting to bring it in line with said name).

Ammendment #2-- "The name of this Association shall be the Illinois Soil Classifiers Association", (as formerly known in ARTICLE I, Sec. 1).

EXPLANATION

The membership has now had (1) year in which to evaluate our Association's new name (Illinois Pedologists Association) while working with the public in the performance of our various duties. Do you feel our identity is understood by the public at large? Now that our lisensing bill is a dead issue, (a major reason for the name change) the Council would like to give the membership an opportunity to take another look at this.

If you are satisfied with our present name you can approve the constitutional changes as provided for in Ammendment #1.

If you are not satisfied with our present name you can defeat Ammendment #1 at the Annual Meeting and consider Ammendment #2. If neither Ammendment is approved at the Annual Meeting, a new name will have to be proposed prior to the 1980 Annual Meeting for consideration by the members (constitutional changes require notice in advance of an Annual Meeting and require a two-thirds affirmative vote of eligible voters present at an Annual Meeting).
